Minutes of General Meeting, January 17, 2010 Texas Gulf Coast Fern Society

A regular monthly meeting was held at the Houston Garden Center, Houston, Texas.

The meeting commenced at 2:10 PM with President, Donna McGraw calling the meeting to order.

General Meeting: Donna McGraw began the meeting by discussing the idea of having an auction to raise money for the society. Additional research on the idea will be done and it will be discussed further at future meetings.

There will be a Federation meeting on the 2nd Friday in March and TGCFS, along with several plant societies, will be supplying the refreshments for approximately 125 people. We could either bring the refreshments or donate funds. Jean Keiser motioned to donate \$50 toward the refreshments. Terri Dolney seconded the motion and it was approved by the members present.

Library: Chair Frank Lee reminded attendees that the Library was open for checking out books and to please return books at the next meeting.

Membership: Chair Mary McConnell reminded attendees to pay their dues if have not done so already.

Newsletter: Editor Cherie Lee reminded members that the Newsletter is posted on the TGCFS website for viewing and /or printing. Please let her know if you are willing to accept an email notification that the Newsletter has been posted and forgo receiving the mailed Newsletter to help save money.

Upcoming Programs: Vice-President Jessica Sheldon discussed the programs for upcoming meetings. These included herbarium / preserving ferns in February, trip to Casa Flora in Dallas in March, Xerophytic Ferns in April, and more exciting programs to come.

Each member was given a binder to hold the data sheets they will be receiving on the plants that are available at the meetings as well as any other useful information.

Plant Propagation: If anyone has ferns that they would like to share and would like help dividing them, they should contact Jessica Sheldon about hosting a propagation party at their home or having interested members meet at the Garden Center before the regular meeting to divide the ferns. Members attending are expected to provide their own pots, potting soil, etc.

Program: Donna McGraw discussed growing ferns indoors. Ferns with thicker fronds are recommended and best if temperatures are 65-68 degrees with humidity of around 60%.

Jessica Sheldon demonstrated the planters that would be used in the hands on workshop. Each member participating received three Austral Gem ferns (cross between *Asplenium dimorphum* and *Asplenium difforme*) to plant in their planter. A plant data sheet was provided with additional information for their notebooks.

Plant Raffle: Frank Lee ran the plant raffle.

Meeting was adjourned at 4:00 PM.

Discussion was held on ways to increase membership. Ideas included:

Terri Dolney reviewed the funding status. Discussion was held around options for generating income. Ted Richardson reminded Board that only two plant sales/auctions were allowed per year. Board discussed possibility of holding an auction this summer, could request plant donations from members, nurseries, other plant societies, etc. Ted Richardson will find out if a permit is required to hold an auction. He will also develop a list of other plant auctions/sales already scheduled and check when the Garden Center is available.

Terri Dolney will work to update the TGCFS bylaws to include the changes required by the government and those approved by the membership over the past several years.

Cherie Lee requested permission to purchase \$44 worth of stamps for mailing the Newsletter-granted by the Board.

February Book Review

“Indoor Ferns” by Boy Altman

This book explains in great detail the correct treatment for ferns: light, water, temperature, fertilizer, repotting – all aspects of caring for the plants are discussed in simple language, and with no complicated scientific terminology. In addition, each variety (about ninety of them are available) is discussed separately in summary form. It tells you how to keep tropical and sub-tropical ferns growing in peak condition and is lavishly illustrated with over 150 color photographs.

This book is intended for every fern lover and there will no longer be any excuse for letting an indoor fern die after only a few months. Every room in the house can be home to some of the many splendid varieties of ferns.
